## **Keyword Searching Strategies and Tips**

STRATEGIES EXAMPLES

Rule #1: Choose the most important words that describe your topic. These become your search terms, or keywords.	Topic: How does the environment in which identical twins are raised affect their behavior?  becomes  Search phrase: "identical twins" and environment and behavior
Rule *2: Put quotation marks around common phrases to ensure that the entire phrase appears in any results.	<ul><li> "identical twins"</li><li> "online privacy protection act"</li><li> "united states of america"</li></ul>
Rule *3: Link multiple words/phrases with  AND to include them all in your search.	<ul> <li>health <u>and</u> safety</li> <li>"psychological testing" <u>and</u> children</li> <li>"personal computers" <u>and</u> "internet privacy"</li> </ul>

TIPS EXAMPLES

If one search is unsuccessful, try using a <i>synonym</i> to increase your results on the next search.	<ul> <li>"media violence" and <u>kids</u> = "media violence" and <u>youth</u></li> <li>"<u>elderly</u> obesity" = "geriatric obesity"</li> <li><u>elections</u> and commercials = <u>campaigns</u> and commercials</li> </ul>
Not getting any results? Don't get too specific—think broadly.	If "shoulder pain" didn't return any results, try broadening the search by using "joint pain;" the items identified might contain more specific information in the index or text.
Too many results? Try narrowing your search by gender, geographical area, year, publication type, etc.	<ul> <li>aging and effects and women</li> <li>"standardized testing" and impact and "united states"</li> <li>"presidential campaign" and advertising and 2008</li> </ul>
Find a good item? Perform a <i>lateral</i> search for similar items by clicking on a subject heading in the record.	In the record for a book about farming, click on the subject heading Agriculture United States to see other items about agriculture in the United States that the library owns.
